St. Valentine Story and Activities

-Lesson Suggestions-

For High Beginners: Before you read, make flashcards with the vocabulary and use actions to get the meaning across. Draw a small picture on each card as a cue.

Read the story slowly, in parts. You may want to divide the story into three sessions. Give the student the parts of the story in the present tense to read with you, but you read the parts in the past tense to the student just to give context.

Do "Writing About Relationships", and then write simple sentences: I love my son. I love my sister. Another option, make a Valentine and write simple Valentine's Day words on it.

Extension: Have the student rank who they love and tell why. You do the same. This is an opportunity to talk about trust and share what is going on in your lives. It could also give you an opportunity to share about your relationship with God.

For Intermediate Learners: Go over the vocabulary list. Have the student put a "check" next to words he or she can explain, act out, or use in a sentence already. Work on the new words.

Read the story in one session, referring back to the vocabulary list when needed.

Do both of the writing activities. Have the student write in short paragraphs instead of single sentences. As the student writes about relationships, discuss who is important to each of you and why. Look for opportunities to share about why your relationship with God is important to you, and how/why we believe **God loves us**!

Language Extension: Have the student underline all the present tense verbs and then change them to the past tense (Make sure the student has already studied the past tense and has a list to refer to). Then reread the story.

For Advanced Learners: Have the student tell you about what he or she already knows about Valentine's Day. Ask if he or she knows where the holiday came from. Have the student read the story silently as a quick read, then answer your question about the holiday's origin by retelling the story. This is a great opportunity to then tell other similar stories of love or sacrifice: The Prodigal Son, Isaac and Rebekah, etc.

Instead of the provided writing activities, ask the student to write a couple of paragraphs as a response to the story: Did you agree or disagree with what Valentine did? Why did he sacrifice himself for what he believed? Have you ever heard of someone doing that?

Spiritual Extensions: Option 1. Here is an opportunity to talk about Jesus' sacrifice by making a natural "Text to Text" connection. Option 2. Use the "Love is..." activity and share about where the verse comes from.


